






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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Congratulations to everyone involved.

With the unwavering support of our dedicated volunteers, the generosity of our sponsors, and the resilience and growth of our athletes in a post-COVID environment, we believe NWT sport will reach new heights. However, we also recognize the need to approach this journey with care. To continue delivering the opportunities our community has come to expect, we must forge deeper partnerships. The challenges facing the entire NWT community require us to make tough decisions and engage in meaningful conversations at all levels. 

SPORT NORTH SCHOLARSHIPS

The purpose of the Sport North Scholarship is to encourage academic success for NWT students who are engaged in sport activities. Preference will be given, but not limited, to students in the field of Kinesiology, Physical Education, Sport Administration, Recreation or Education (majoring in Physical Education). Dedication to sport and academic excellence are taken into consideration in determining scholarship recipients.



CHLOE MALIN YELLOWKNIFE

Chloe Asha Malin, is a dedicated judoka from Yellowknife. Starting judo at the age of five, Chloe has competed nationally, earning a bronze medal at the Pacific International Invitational Judo Tournament in Richmond, B.C. She trains under the guidance of Nick Tritton, a two-time Olympian, at the National Training Centre in Montreal, where she moved to in September 2021 to pursue her dream of making the Senior National Judo Team. While training Chloe is at Concordia University, majoring in Design, Fine Arts.



KYRA MCDONALD Inuvik

Kyra McDonald, a third-year Human Kinetics student at Trinity Western University and a notable member of the Spartan women's hockey team, has distinguished herself both academically and athletically. Hailing from Inuvik, NT, her leadership extended beyond sports as she led her team to a gold medal at the 2018 Arctic Winter Games and was honoured as the flag bearer for Team Northwest Territories at the 2023 Wood Buffalo Arctic Winter Games. Balancing a near 3.0 GPA with her athletic commitments, Kyra has also been a vocal advocate for the National Day for Truth & Reconciliation, using her platform to educate and foster community healing. Her proactive engagement in both her studies and community initiatives exemplifies her dedication and drive, making her an exemplary figure in the university's pursuit of holistic excellence through the Complete Champion Approach.

SPORT NORTH SCHOLARSHIPS



MICHAEL SADLER YELLOWKNIFE

Michael Sadler, a player and volunteer coach at the Yellowknife Galaxy Soccer Academy, has demonstrated exceptional dedication and leadership, particularly in his role coaching the under 7 age group. Over the past two years, he has not only organized and conducted practices independently but also infused a strong work ethic and a team-oriented mindset into his coaching. Michael's influence extends beyond the playing field; he has significantly enriched the Academy's community spirit and overall performance. His commitment to soccer and his ability to inspire young athletes have rightfully earned him a scholarship, recognizing his potential and his contributions as both a player and a coach. Michael is currently studying Psychology at Kings University.



RUBY PIGOTT YELLOWKNIFE

Ruby Pigott, a dedicated biathlete from Yellowknife, is recognized by her exemplary athletic achievements and leadership qualities. Ruby, who plans to study abroad in Australia, has consistently demonstrated sportsmanship and mentorship, notably as a senior athlete at the Arctic Winter Games and a coach at the Yellowknife Ski Club. Her commitment to biathlon and her community, coupled with her academic aspirations, make her a deserving recipient of this scholarship, supporting her educational and athletic journey. Ruby is currently studying Kinesiology at Vancouver island University

LEADERSHIP

The Sport North AGM, held on May 26 & 27 in Yellowknife with the theme "Hope on the Horizon," exemplified strong leadership across various facets of sport development. The event began with a Friday evening presentation from Sport Law on leading an ethically driven and legally sound sport organization. This focus on leadership continued through Saturday's workshops and training sessions, which addressed major trends affecting sport, management by values, measuring culture, and quality of presence.

Demonstrating its strategic leadership, Sport North hosted a strategic planning session facilitated by Caroline Sparks, attended by 28 Sport/Affiliate Members and a total of 52 participants. Over the past fiscal year, the Sport North Board, consisting of eight members, met six times, including a comprehensive planning meeting in Inuvik attended by all staff. This consistent engagement underscores the organization's commitment to effective governance and forward-thinking leadership.

Sport North's leadership in coaching development is evident through the range of clinics offered, from entry-level to high-performance levels. These clinics include sport-specific programs and general courses provided by the National Coaching Certification Program. In partnership with the Coaching Association of Canada, Sport North promoted and provided free coaching events during National Coaches Week. Additionally, coaches from Yellowknife, Fort Providence, and Inuvik enhanced their leadership skills through the Comp Intro coach developer facilitation upgrade training, which includes a mental health component.

The She Can Coach Grant is a testament to Sport North's commitment to empowering female-identifying coaches by providing financial assistance to support their coaching pathways and education/training at all levels. These coaches are highlighted on social media and receive appreciation gifts, further reinforcing their leadership roles. Similarly, the They Can Coach program supports coaches aiming to elevate their skills, develop peer networks, and become role models for aspiring NWT coaches, including participants in the Canada Winter Games and Canada Summer Games.

To foster leadership and growth in athletes, Sport North has created processes to provide opportunities for coaches and athletes to advance to higher levels of sport. We continue to seek partnerships with Southern Colleges for identifying and recruiting NWT athletes, and we collaborate with school placement programs. A key priority is aligning with NSO's Athlete Pathway and initiating the creation and implementation of an NWT Athlete Pathway that is not sport-specific, demonstrating our commitment to holistic athlete development and leadership in sport.







OPERATIONS

Sport North is committed to ensuring the sport system has strong financial and human resources, from grassroots to high-performance participation, by continually securing long-term funding with the GNWT and discovering ways to partner with organizations within the sport sector.

Sport North enhances its operations for the benefit of the Territorial Sport Organizations and key members of the NWT sport community by developing clear roles and responsibilities for the Federation and its partner organizations. With our partners, Sport North shares knowledge, maximizes resources, and leverages opportunities and efficiencies at the community, territorial, and national levels to achieve sport sector objectives, resulting in a better-connected and coordinated sector.

Sport North represents the NWT sport community at the national level with ongoing membership in the Canadian Council of Provincial and Territorial Sport Federations and the National Trust Fund. The Federation also maintains relationships with KidSport Canada, the Coaching Association of Canada, the Canada Games Council, and Canada Sport for Life.

For a cohesive vision of the role of sport in the NWT, Sport North actively communicates with and encourages communication among all sport organizations. It advocates to ensure that the needs and interests of our Territorial Sport Organizations are clearly understood and effectively represented in national programs and initiatives. Through regular communication, Sport North's public relations efforts have established stronger relationships with partners, stakeholders, and TSOs, supporting cooperative work toward common goals within the sport sector.



CAPACITY



Sport North has been instrumental in facilitating opportunities to explore innovative programs for the benefit of its membership. One such initiative is the Common Vision – Breaking the Cycle (PHAC funded) Version 3, which concluded with a partnership with Aurora College to produce a Northern Resource (video and manual) supporting Early Years Early Childhood Educators with a strong physical literacy focus, set for release in Fall 2024.

To commemorate National Indigenous Peoples Day (June 21st), the City of Yellowknife continues to display light standard banners promoting the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action for Sport.

In the realm of gender equity, Sport North supported the Canadian Women in Sport poster campaign, aimed at clarifying gender equity challenges faced within NWT Sport. This campaign will be followed up in 2024-25 with actions addressing identified priorities. Additionally, strategies to build self-esteem and engage young females in sport were hosted by Girls in the Game, alongside Coach James Leath's virtual webinars on "Forging Young Men of Character."

The Inspire Through Sport leadership and mentor development program targets teenage female athletes looking to develop their skills in life and sport. This program was embraced by four self-directed girls from volleyball, badminton, soccer, and fastball.

Sport North also plays a significant role in the National LGBTQ Sport Inclusion Task Force, focusing on how the Federation can support this national initiative. Similarly, Sport North is actively involved in the National Parasport Collective, aiming to support Para Sport development within the NWT and focusing on inclusive sport environments for BIPOC, LGBTQ, and newcomers to NWT Sport.

The Women in Coaching (WiC) mentorship program, orchestrated through the Coaching Association of Canada, supports female coaches in their development. The Rising Star Program, which follows the CS4L train-to-train model, provides funding to athletes (females 11 to 15 and males 12 to 16) who exhibit potential in their sport and wish to receive additional training through a camp format.

For the first time, KidSport NWT incorporated paid ads into its marketing strategy to promote the Spring Community Equipment Grant (CEG), generating 39,622 impressions on the page in one month. By running paid ads before each Spring and Fall CEG deadline, Sport North aims to reach more communities and distribute as many grants as possible. This effort resulted in 68 successful applications from 27 teams/organizations in 12 sports, and 27 applications for the community equipment grant from eight new communities, demonstrating effective communication and outreach to smaller communities.

The second Roger Walker Annual Golf Tournament in support of KidSport, sponsored by Nahanni Construction, was held on July 7th, 2023. This 18-hole tournament offered competition and fun, with numerous auction prizes, including a "Hockey Package" which included air fair, tickets to a hockey game in Edmonton, and a room in a hotel room.

With long-standing partnerships with NWT/NU Lotteries, Canadian North, Top of the World Travel Agency, Nova Hotels, and Northwestel, Sport North consistently offers its members the best opportunities for their teams and upcoming events by developing cost-effective partnerships with the private sector, allowing for alignment of programs and events with corporate support.

PARTICIPATION AND PERFORMANCE

In the 2023-2024 period, Sport North participated in the 2024 Arctic Winter Games held in Mat-Su, Alaska, where we sent over 400 people. Rita Mercredi served as the Chef De Mission for the Arctic Winter Games, supported by Lexi Letzing and Damon Crossman as assistant chefs.

During the Arctic Winter Games, the team secured 26 gold ulus, 38 silver ulus, and 33 bronze ulus. Keira Coakwell from Hay River and Sean Grandjambe from Fort Smith led the opening ceremony as flag bearers for the volleyball team, while Corbin Alonak from Ulukhaktok represented wrestling as the flag bearer for the closing ceremony.

We were thrilled to announce that Team NT achieved a historic milestone by winning the gold ulu in female basketball for the first time since the games' inception in 1970. This remarkable feat was a testament to the relentless efforts and commitment of the female basketball team, including coaches, athletes, and volunteers.

Additionally, Shawna McLeod claimed the stick pull gold ulu in the open women's category, a new age group introduced at the Arctic Winter Games. Despite the long wait for this category, McLeod's achievement was a source of immense pride for us.




To enhance the communication with our members' and the public, Sport North uses social media to promote events, results and success throughout the NWT.



TEAM NT AT THE ARCTIC WINTER GAMES




Team NT had an extraordinary performance at the 2024 Arctic Winter Games, winning a total of 97 Ulus, which included 26 Gold Ulus, 38 Silver Ulus, and 33 Bronze Ulus. Among the many highlights, Team NT made history by winning gold in Female Basketball for the first time ever, marking a significant milestone in the team's achievements.

The athletes demonstrated exceptional skill and determination across various events, contributing to this impressive medal haul. Traditional Arctic sports saw Team NT secure multiple gold medals, while winter sports like skiing, snowboarding, and hockey also featured strong performances.

The coaches and support staff were pivotal in preparing the athletes, ensuring they were ready to compete at their best. Beyond the medals, Team NT earned widespread admiration for their teamwork, perseverance in challenging conditions, and their role as proud ambassadors of the Northwest Territories.

This success at the 2024 Arctic Winter Games is a testament to the commitment and effort of the entire team, making this event a memorable and celebrated chapter in the history of Team NT.
